MOVIE SCREENING TOOLKIT





One of the most important ways to get the word out about the power of forests and the issues facing Southern forests and communities is to host a video viewing party. Over the years, Dogwood Alliance has released numerous videos highlighting our work to defend Southern forests and communities, and we have been featured in an award-winning documentary about the threat of the biomass industry. Below is a toolkit to help get your event started!

1. WHICH MOVIE?

Do you want to expose the biomass industry? Watch the documentary Burned: Are Trees the Coal? Do you want to highlight people's deep connection to forests? Check out our Stories Happen in Forests series. Visit our Videos page for all our videos!

2. WHAT KIND OF SCREENING?

Movie screenings are a great way to educate a community about an issue. Host an event for the public or for your friends. Decide if it's open to the public & how many people you want to invite. Are guests allowed to invite other people?

3. TIME & LOCATION.

Will you host this in your home or host it in a community gathering center? Wherever you host the screening, be sure to investigate what equipment and supplies will be provided and what you must bring yourself.

4. ADVERTISE!

Create a Facebook event and/or send an email to all of your friends inviting them to the event, and ask them to invite others. Checkout the Outreach section to learn more.



5. MATERIALS

Does the venue have film screening materials already? Do you need speakers? Do you want to serve food? See the Materials section for a checklist.

6. COME PREPARED!

There are a few things to keep in mind on the day of the event to make it a success, especially if you are inviting many people from the community. Checkout the **Day of the Event** section for a few tips.

7. FOLLOW UP.


Following up with your attendees after the event is one of the most important parts of organizing. This allows you to send them any information you mentioned during the event and give them ways to get involved.

Our connection to the woods is part of who we are and why we fight to protect our forests.

ENVIRONMENTAL JUSTICE & BIOMASS

The biomass and wood pellet industry led by Enviva, the world's largest wood pellet manufacturer, are harming our forests, communities, and climate. We have short videos that give viewers the scoop on what the biomass industry is and many that share the stories of communities fighting to keep this industry out of their neighborhood -- like Rising up with Richmond County and Selling Out Sampson County.


THE WETLAND WANDERER

OUTREACH

In your invitation it is important to include a small amount of background information about Dogwood Alliance and about the specific video(s) that you will be viewing. Be sure to include the date and location for the viewing. An example invitation that focuses on *BURNED:* Are Trees the New Coal? is below. 
GET THE WORD OUT!

- Personally invite your friends! Email them. Call them. Text them. Ask them to invite their friends and family, too.
- Create a poster. Put posters up in high traffic areas or ask popular businesses or restaurants if they can put a poster up in their window.
- Create handouts. Pass these around to people downtown, farmers' markets, popular events, etc.

- Collaborate with organizations or community groups. The more the merrier! Reach out to groups that may be concerned about these issues and see if they would like to work with you on this film screening.

 friends & send them a personal
 invitation (email, call, text).
 Share the event around on
 Facebook. If you have Twitter or
 Instagram, share your event
 there. Ask your friends and
 followers to invite others.

- Is the location easy to find? Is there parking nearby? If not, you may want to consider bringing signs to put up so people can find their way.

DAY OF THE EVENT



Arrive early! It's important to show up to the venue early to properly set up the room as well as guarantee that everything works.



Bring friends! Have a couple friends or volunteers show up early to assist with setup. In the case that you run into an unexpected obstacle, having someone else to resolve the problem can allow you to focus on making sure the event will run smoothly.



Double check the materials list. To be sure you don't forget anything at home, have all of the materials ready, including information printed, the day before. Then you'll have less to worry about the day of.



Come with a smile! Be sure to keep a positive attitude and welcome everyone as they arrive. Show that you're excited and thankful that they came out to your film screening.



Have a sign-in sheet! This makes sure you have everyone's name and contact info so you can follow up with them afterwards.

In order to hold a productive discussion, it is important to come prepared with discussion questions. Below is an example of a short introduction to Dogwood Alliance and some example discussion questions.

"Dogwood Alliance is a nonprofit organization based in Asheville, NC. For over 20 years, Dogwood Alliance has worked with diverse communities, partner organizations and decision-makers to protect Southern forests and communities across 14 states. They do this through community and grassroots organizing, holding corporations and governments accountable, and working to conserve millions of acres of Southern forests and wetlands. Recently, Dogwood has focused on protecting our Southern forests and wetlands from being cut down and turned into wood pellets that will be burned for fuel, elevating forest protection as a critical climate solution, and working with communities for environmental and climate justice. These videos highlight just some of the work that Dogwood has been doing recently."

Decide discussion questions based on the movie you are screening. Here are examples:

- Had you heard about this issue before watching the film?
- What is environmental justice? Are there potential environmental justice communities near us or threats of environmental injustice?
- What would you be most concerned about if this issue was in your community?
- What would we do if a company, like Enviva, came here and threatened to clear our forests and harm our community?
- What are ways we can make our concerns heard?
- How are you connected to forests? What stories have happened to you in a forest?

Be sure to end by giving people a chance to take action. Many people will be excited by the movie, creating a great opportunity to act. A good final question could simply be "How can we help?" Here are some ways:

- Sign up to receive emails from Dogwood on our Join the Movement page
- Encourage people to join Dogwood's monthly giving program, Forest Defenders
- Sign petitions, send letters, and find other ways to take action on our campaigns on our **Act Now** page.
- Make a one-time gift
- Follow @DogwoodAlliance on Facebook, Twitter, or Instagram
- Get the word out! Have people talk with their friends, email information out, and post our links on social media.





THINGS TO DO AFTER THE EVENT
